

VILLAGE HALL TALK

Following our AGM in July we welcomed Phil Badcott to give a talk. Phil has recently had a book published entitled 'The March of William of Orange through Devon', and in this well-attended talk he was able to bring to life this seminal moment in English history.

Replacing an existing monarch with a foreign usurper does, on the face of it, seem like a coup although, as Phil explained, James 11 was not popular, and William did have family ties to the English throne. Importantly, William did have powerful and influential allies among the English gentry who supported him. Right from the outset in Brixham he was welcomed by the Roope family of Dartmouth, the Seymours of Berry Pomeroy Castle, the Mallocks of Cockington Court and the Courtenays of Forde House.

This pattern of support proved crucial politically as he travelled up country. What was more problematical, as Phil explained, were the practical issues including the low tide in Brixham Harbour, the awful November weather and the red muddy un-metalled lanes of South Devon. His route from Brixham took him through Churston, Paignton, Marldon, Compton Castle, Compton Mill, Bickley Mill, Abbotskerswell and Newton Abbot. Various claims have been put forward that he stayed in Paignton or in Compton Castle or at Pitt House in Kingskerswell but what we do know for sure is that he spent the night of the 7th of November 1688 at Forde House in Newton Abbot. The following day he marched on to Exeter via Chudleigh and the rest, as they say, is History.

William did not arrive in London until 17th December 1688 and he and his wife Mary were not crowned King and Queen until April 1689. The coronation only took place after William had agreed to have the power of his monarchy limited by Parliament.
